Text sermon questions, during the sermon, to (602) 824-8030

“What do you think about the Christ, whose son is He?”

The Pharisees answered, “*The son of David.*”

Jesus did some Bible study with the Pharisees - David’s Psalm 110:1

The true nature of the Christ/Messiah, He is Lord

King David called the Messiah “my Lord.”

(Ref.: Hebrews 1:13, Acts 2:34-36)

The Messiah is the divine Lord of heaven.

Whose son is the Messiah? The Son of God.

The Messiah is more than a human. He is God.

Jesus is the Christ/Messiah, so He is the Lord.

Application: Love the Lord by living and thinking the ways He wants.

No one was able to answer Him a word.

They couldn’t argue against the evidence, proving the human Messiah is also God.

They had been wrong about the Messiah.

Jesus is the Messiah-Savior. Jesus is Lord.

Application: Trust Him as Savior, and Lord.

Application: Treat Him as Lord, by doing what He says.

One way: Love those around you as you love yourself.

Application questions for 2-15-15 sermon Matthew 22:41-46

What do you think you have learned new or come to understand better about the Messiah as we have been studying through Matthew?

How did this sermon challenge your understanding of who Jesus is?

Are you convinced that Jesus is God who came to be a human?

Are you convinced that Jesus is the Lord?

If so, are you treating Him as Lord, by doing what He says - living your life His ways, and changing your thinking the ways He wants.

One of the things He wants, is us to love the people around us.
Is there a particular person, or group of people, you need to love better?

How specifically do you think you need to do that better?
What might you do?

(I acknowledge up front this is a complicated, and kind of weird question. But I think it could be really helpful to think about.)

It seems to me that the Pharisees wanted so badly to be set free from Roman oppression, and to enjoy the good life, like they imagined it was for Israel under king David, that they ignored parts of what the Scriptures said about the Messiah, and didn't recognize Jesus was the Messiah, because He wasn't what they hoped for.

Are you really looking to God and the Bible for God's truth, and how He wants you to live? Or are you just looking for what you want/hope to be true, to make life what you imagine to be better in your own human ways?
