7:1-3 **Melchizedek is a type** (symbol that looks forward to) **of Jesus Christ**

(Ref.: Genesis 14:17-20)

The priesthood of Jesus Christ never ends.

7:4-10 **Mel's priesthood is superior to the Levitical priesthood**
as a symbol of how Christ's priesthood is superior

Are you loyal to any human above Christ?

The priesthood has been passed to someone who lives forever, Christ. (ref.: Psalm 110:4)

Loyalty should be shifted to Jesus Christ.

Are you holding onto any beliefs or loyalties from old religion?

7:11-19 **Change from a deficient priesthood to a perfect one**

People need a priest to permanently make us right with God, forever. Christ can, because He is eternally alive.

Jesus is the only way to come to God.

7:20-25 **Jesus lives forever, holds His priesthood permanently, and so is able to save all who come to God through Him.**

7:26-28 **Jesus' perfect sacrifice only had to be offered once**

His sacrifice is enough to pay for the sins of all, permanently.

Do you trust Jesus as your only way to eternal relationship with God?
