We are busy.

Jesus was very busy. (vs. 32-34, 36-39)

But Jesus made time for quiet time. (vs. 35)

Very early

Focused time

It was the pattern of Jesus. (Luke 5:15-16)

We need it.

A focused time to pray, when it's the only thing we concentrate on

We make time for things we value.

Decide on a time that is going to work for you.

Jesus did it early in the morning, or sometimes in the evening.
(Matthew 14:23)

Decide on a place for focus.

Before or away

No distractions

Start immediately, or get back to it immediately.

What do you think will be the challenges with doing it? And how do you think you need to plan to overcome those?

If you have never done a quiet time before, do you think you might like someone to walk you through how you might do it?
